THE SPIRIT WHO DWELLS WITHIN US

"If the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you."

Romans; Ch. 8, Vs. 11

God's spirit is everlasting life and those who are baptized in the water and in the Spirit pass from death to life. They receive sanctifying grace; in other words, the Spirit of God takes up his abode in them.

They must let themselves be led by that same Spirit into the valley of the death of all things perishable, if they are to attain life everlasting.

Come Holy Ghost, Creator blest,
Vouchsafe within our souls to rest;
Come with thy grace and heavenly aid, and fill the hearts which thou hast made.
-Veni, Creator Spiritus

Our spiritual life is an everlasting life, which we receive through the power of God's eternal Spirit.

The prophet Elias was at the point of leaving this earth, when his disciple Eleseus asked him, as a parting gift, for a double portion of the spirit.

Christ was about to return to His Heavenly Father, when He promised his disciples to send them, not a portion of His Spirit, but the Holy Spirit itself: "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." (Acts; Ch. 1, Vs. 8). The Holy Spirit, that is to say, the Spirit, of Whom Christ spoke, through his prophet Isaiah, "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me; because the Lord hath anointed me." (Isaiah; Ch. 61, Vs. 1)

If the Spirit of the Lord is the Spirit of Christ, it must also be the spirit of all Christians.

As holy Mary became the mother of Jesus Christ by the over-shadowing of the Holy Ghost, so we, by the same Spirit, become his brothers and sisters. The difference between a pagan and a Christian is that the pagan is possessed by the spirit of evil, and the Christian possessed by the Spirit of God.

The Holy Ghost, given to us at *Baptism*, gains a greater power over us in *Confirmation*. It is a power that increases with every sacrament that we receive. We become more perfect as we become fuller in the Holy Spirit, "The love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given to us." (Romans; Ch. 5, Vs. 5) . . . who is the love of the Father for the Son, and the love of the Son for the Father.

The personal love of God's innermost being is also that which is poured into our own hearts, and which lives and works in us, giving baptized souls the nobility which is the right of all who have God for their Father. Mere human acts of charity acquire a supernatural value and merit of an everlasting reward, by that love. St. Cyprian in the 3rd century magnified this when he wrote: "An illustrious and divine thing, dearest brethren, is this saving work of charity; a great comfort of believers, a wholesome guard of our security, a protection of hope, a safeguard of faith, a remedy of sin, a thing placed in the power of the doer, a thing both great . . . and easy." (Excerpt from On Works and Alms, 26).

The Holy Ghost prays in us. His prayer is our prayer. He says in us "Abba, Father" which we, ourselves, can't say without it being hollow and empty. The Holy Ghost gives worth to our actions which He inspires within us, but above all, He whom the Father sends to befriend us; "I will pray the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter that he may abide with you forever." (John Ch 14, Vs. 16). He gives love which flourishes itself in us, thus helping us to be true to the commandment which is the very essence of Christianity, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God, and thy neighbor as thyself."

That's why Christ at the last Supper could bid his followers to love each other as He had loved them. Christ's love is divine and eternal; ours, by the action of the Holy Ghost, becomes spiritual and steadfast. What more could we ask for?

<u>Prayer for the day:</u> O taste and see how gracious the Lord is: blessed is he that putteth his trust in him. – *Psalm 34*

Note(s): 1. August 1st - St. Ethelwold; Bp. O.S.B. d. 984 St. Ethelwold, along with Sts. Dunstan and Oswald share the merit of having rescued the Church in England from a rapid decline in the 10th century. A native of Winchester, he received his tonsure from St. Elphege, Bishop of Winchester. He joined St. Dunstan at Glastonbury Abbey where he was later elevated Dean of the Abbey. Ethelwold was elevated to the See of Winchester and as Bishop began a strict program of reform and austerity with his clergy. As a Benedictine, he also assisted Oswald in the reformation of the pre-Conquest Benedictine Houses in England. He was devoted to the relief of the poor and forced many of the nobles to share their wealth in food assistance to the poor. Rather than challenge him, the nobles were overtaken by his own humility, poverty, and sanctity and were generous to their people.
