#### SPEECH - A GIFT TO BE USED WISELY

Today's Epistle, while being very brief, contains lots of material for a variety of themes. The second half of the Epistle with its instructions on the moderation of speech, is most appealing. Sins of the tongue were rife in ancient Israel as we can gather from the many sayings of the Prophets, the writings of the Psalmist, and the words from the Wisdom Books. St. James knew quite well this failing of his people, and he frequently brought this up in his writings. This same failing is *overwhelmingly widespread* among mankind today, and even people who are models of piety and uprightness seem to be unable to keep control of or maintain moderation in their speech.

St. Benedict, who had studied and digested Holy Scripture in the formation of his Holy Rule, understood well the dangers that lay in too much speaking. St. Benedict wrote, in Chapter 6 (*On Silence*)....

Let us do as the prophet (Psalmist)says: "I have said I will keep my ways so that I will not offend with my tongue. I have guarded my speech. I held my peace and humbled myself and was silent, even from speaking good things." - (Psalm 39, Vs. 1 & 2). Here the prophet (Psalmist) demonstrates that if we are not to speak of good things, for the sake of silence, it is even more vital that we not speak of evil lest we sin, for we shall be punished for that as a sin. No matter how perfect the disciple, nor how good and pious his (her) speech, he rarely should be given permission to speak for:

"In much speaking you shall not escape sin." - (Proverbs; Ch.10, Vs. 19).

St. Benedict knew well that even within light conversation and idle speaking lay opportunities for the brethren to wander into sin through speech, so he provided specifically for that within his Rule i.e. (He *made* an 'app' for that!)...!

The sin of intemperance in speech, consists not merely cursing, swearing, and lewdness, but lies also in the expression of injurious and malicious statements about someone, and belittlement, which are such common actions. We should keep in mind that the lips that speak such things, also receive the Blessed Sacrament, and even worse yet . . . lips that speak the Sacred words of Consecration and Absolution! God forbid and have mercy! Sordid motives can be inferred, a person's character ruined, and false alarms (over trifles) easily started by such intemperance . . . even by people accepted as "good churchmen", that one feels that the throats of many Christians are just like "open sepulchers" . . . and that "with their tongues they acted deceitfully; the poison of adders is under their lips." - (Psalm 13, Vs. 3 {Vulgate}).

St. James's teaching to us in today's Epistle contains the wisdom which will exclude this great folly of intemperate and injurious speech: "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath." A readiness to always hear the truth of things, a quiet and sober deliberation before we speak (or write), and a self-control that is strong enough to maintain silence until the tide of anger has subsided. These are indeed the things that enable us to savor that sweetness of the "rooted Word" and to "produce the justice of God."

If we temper our speech with *charity* . . . perhaps the Good God will look upon our own sins and failings a bit more patiently.

Prayer for the day: I will sing unto the Lord as long as I live: I will praise my God while I have my being. And so shall my words please him: my joy shall be in the Lord -Psalm 104

Pandy

**Pandy** (*Pandora*) is getting old and each day we are reminded how far she has come in her life.....

Sr Mary Francis got a call one day several years ago from a woman who had a dog who was supposedly a year old that they had gotten from a shelter. They had taken the female dog home where they already had an intact male boxer. They were mystified when the dog got pregnant and the abuse began. Pandy was beaten, kicked and starved mostly by a boyfriend who dressed in work boots and "hoodies". She had broken ribs and a broken spirit. The pads on her feet were permanently ruined from being skidded across surfaces when she did not want to go. Her toe nails are deformed from having her feet stomped on. She also had eye issues (strabismus) that makes her see double so she interpreted the abuse from one person as abuse from a crowd. The woman's call was desperate. The dog would soon have the puppies and the boyfriend was threatening to drown the puppies and shoot the dog. The dog did have the puppies the next day and everyone was horrified by what was going to happen. Of course we said we would take them, so 2 days later she brought everyone to a meeting place for us to pick them up. The 5 puppies were put in our truck and the dog, growling, skulked quickly into the back seat. She was anxious to get away from the people. We took them all home where Sr. had made a cave like pen in the kitchen. The other house dogs introduced themselves to her and the puppies and eventually she came out of her shell. We named her Pandora because, like Pandora's box, we were not sure what was inside. Sr. had told her on the way home that she and Sr. were going to be the best of friends. That part has come to pass. Pandy's puppies grew big and healthy and were placed in wonderful homes. Pandy's ribs healed and slowly so did her spirit. The first year that she was with us no one was allowed to wear hats, hoodies, or work boots in our home. She still does not like them. The first year with us she would drop to the ground and crawl out the door just to get past the work boots that we keep out there. We can wear boots near her now. She also loves to wear seasonal bandanas and has a huge collection. Pandy would like it best if Sr. never left the house but has learned to cope with her being absent while she works, and is so happy to see her when she comes home. Pandy sleeps with Sr. and now spends most of her day one the couch sleeping and watching TV. She loves Judge Judy and gets upset if something prevents her from seeing it each day. Pandy, as it turns out, was at least 5 years old when she came to us, not the year old that the shelter had said, and she had been obviously bred several times. She is 12 or more now and graying about the face, but thanks to your generosity, she has been able to live a peaceful, interesting and happy life here with us and the other dogs. She thanks you for being so kind and wishes you a happy spring.
