#### The Collect for the Third Sunday after Trinity

O Lord, we beseech thee mercifully to hear us; and grant that we, who whom thou hast given an hearty desire to pray, may, by thy mighty aid, be defended and comforted in all dangers and adversities; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### I will draw all Men unto me.

Ever since the Son of God appeared upon earth, and was lifted up on His Cross of glory, the history of the world was changed. It became the history of that attraction by which Jesus, meek and humble of heart, has established the kingdom of God upon earth.

The **Logos**, The Word, the Son of God, was at the origin of all things. We are familiar, in St. John's Gospel, (The'Last Gospel' recited at the close of a High Mass), with the words: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." (St. John; Ch. 1, Vss 1-3.") All creation is drawn to Him because it was made by Him. "For by Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible. . . . all things were created by Him, and for Him. And He is before all things, and by Him all things consist." - (Colossians; Ch. 1, Vss. 16 & 17).

We live in a time that is fraught with high anxiety, fear, and uncertainty. 'Experts', whether they be scientists, political pundits, or sociologists, give us a myriad of reasons why this is so but perhaps there is a simpler answer. Perhaps it's because we as a species are simply homesick. We are homesick for our real homeland... a Heavenly Homeland. Christ is the answer to our homesickness; He attracts all creatures, because He is their last end; He alone can promise healing, rest, and happiness to all who come to Him. "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: And ye shall find rest unto your souls." – (St. Matthew; Ch. 11, Vss. 28 & 29). We have come to a point in our existence where we believe that we hold all the answers to the problems that essentially we, as a species have created . . . perhaps we need to start looking in another direction. How appropriate is the saying that goes: "Wise men still seek Him".

Mankind fell away from God, all creation lost its way. Sin was an attack on Christ's kingship. Creation also was estranged from its Creator when mankind became a stranger to God. Instead of singing God's praises by the lips of mankind, it now "groans and travails in pain together." – (Romans; Ch. 8, Vs. 22)."

**All** authority in heaven and on earth was given to Him by the Father when the Son of Man was thrown out of his own city and fastened to and lifted up on a Cross, (*rf. : Matt. Ch. 28, Vs. 18*). \* "He is the same also that ascended up far above all heavens, that he might fill all things."- (Ephesians; Ch. 4, Vs. 11).

This attraction to Christ, if we follow it, satisfies the deepest longings of our fallen race, yet for us, the way to it is the way of the Cross. A return implies salvation from sin, from death and corruption but it's a salvation which is only made possible by conforming to Christ.

The throne from which our King rules over all hearts is the lowest throne conceivable – the Throne of the Cross; the Cross upon which Christ was glorified, becoming "a life-giving spirit" (I Corinthians; Ch. 15, Vs. 45). . . "And I, if I be lifted from the earth, will draw all men unto me" – (St. John; Ch. 12, Vs. 32). The Cross raised Jesus to His eternal throne of Glory, at the right hand of the Father. He was the grain of wheat buried deep in the earth, that brings forth new life, and brings it a hundredfold. It is to his Cross that He draws all those whom He baptizes in His Spirit.

The Cross, the Spirit, and the glory are inseparable in the life of the Christian, but let us ask ourselves: What has become of the Lord's prophecy? So many are far from being attracted to Him, and so very many deny Him. A general apostasy passing unnoticed today, seems to neutralize His power of attraction. There are so few lovers of Christ's Cross. . . even among His own. How often do we miss the life-giving influence of the Cross and go about living life for ourselves and not Him? What is to be done?

Christ's reign is founded on a law which escapes us. God's thoughts are not ours; they are by definition as high above ours as the heavens are above the earth. (*Ref. Isaiah*; *Ch. 55*, *Vs. 9*) \* \*

By faith only can we realize that as Jesus saved us by humiliations and sufferings, so it is by many tribulations that His Church founds His Kingdom on earth. "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up: That whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life." – (St. John; Ch. 3, Vss. 14 & 15).

Our faith lives and moves in love; the Crucified Christ calls one and all, but forces none; delicacy and discretion define the Divine Sacred Heart: "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me." (Revelation: Ch. 3, Vs. 20).

**O** Lord, may all other voices fall silent, that we may hear Yours, and Yours only. We surrender our hearts to You; grant us the rest you have promised. Teach us to give you little things, so that when the day comes we may not refuse You those things that are greater.

## From the Fathers of the Church

#### St. Gregory the Great

"Let us meditate, if we can, upon the supreme piety of this. The just are threatened with punishments if they fall. Sinners are promised mercy so they may rise up again. Some are frightened so that they may not weaken; others are encouraged so that they may not despair.

Are you just? Fear his anger so that you may not fall. Are you a sinner? Have confidence in the mercy of God and then rise up."

"He opens to us the floodgates of his mercy and desires that we should do sincere penance. This consists of giving up, not one, but all our sins, because of what use is it to repent of sins against the flesh when we are still falling into that of avarice?

We should take one more step and, having made an abuse of what was unlawful, we should now abstain from that which is lawful and thus check in small things him who once fell in big things.

Look at the repentance of David, for example. First of all he fell into what was gravely sinful, with the wife of Urias, and then he knew well how to sacrifice the licit pleasure of a glass of water of which he thought himself unworthy. (*Rf. 2 Kings; Ch. 23, Vs. 17*). "

The very one we despise calls us; we separate ourselves from him, but he does not separate himself from us. He put his law before our eyes to guide us, but we turn away from our creator; and behold how he follows us, calling out to us, and even though he is despised, he never ceases to cry out to us . . . . He calls by means of his precepts and waits for us in patience. If a servant set himself up against us, would we tolerate his lack of respect? Well, that is our situation; we turn our backs on God and not only does he tolerate it, but he promises to reward us if we return to him. May such great mercy on the part of the creator soften the hardness of our evil, and may man who could have been punished feel shame at least when he sees that God is waiting for him."
