The Epistle for the Day: St. Paul's 2<sup>nd</sup> Letter to the Corinthians; Ch. 3, Vss. 4 - 9

A phrase used in today's Epistle that stands out: "... the letter (of the law) killeth, but the spirit giveth life" can be understood as referring to two ways of practicing religion, rather than contrasting the effects of two different religions. This can serve us well as source for today's meditation.

We can read, almost anywhere in the Gospels, that the teachings of our Lord contrast against the Rabbinical teaching of our Lord's day. The Pharisees, who were the leading exponents of that teaching, are often depicted as slaves of a legalism that was dominated by a huge system of precepts, positive and negative, which were accepted in a rigidly legal fashion. The tendency of the Pharisees apparently, is to regard all religious activity as the fulfillment of legal exactness. Religion became almost completely external with them, where the heart played as little a part as it does with most people who carry out the commands and statutes of the State. The reward of religious performance, in the Rabbinical system, was determined quite specifically, and in as much detail as is the salary of a civil servant. So, by Christ's day, the Jewish religion had become almost purely external. Little doubt it was heavily influenced by political survival and influence (and *influencing*), as well.

The teachings of the old Hebrew prophets, with its insistence on uprightness and cleanness of heart, was forgotten, and our Lord could honestly describe the Pharisees as more concerned with outward appearances of the cup, than with its contents . . . He quite rightly 'called them out' when He described them as: "whitewashed sepulchres" . . . fair-looking on the outside, but rotten to the core inside. It's against that spirit of legalism and externalism that most of the Sermon on the Mount (see St. Matthew; Chap 5-7), is directed, and the constant tendency of our Lord's own teaching was to set the people free from the dishonesty and the literalism of the existing Rabbinical doctrine.

Thus Christianity, as against Judaism, was a doctrine of freedom. It was also a *doctrine of the spirit* insisting rather on the righteousness of heart and disposition than on precise execution of commands, demanding a genuine love of God and of neighbor rather than the verbal fulfillment of the law, emphasizing the inner side of conduct and not the outer - more concerned with the contents of the vessel than with its exterior polish.

There can be found, among Catholic Christians, people of the letter as well as people of the spirit – even though God seeks only such worshippers as would worship Him in *spirit* and in *truth*. Human fallibility, because of its imperfections will always create such conditions, but that doesn't mean that striving *for* perfection is beyond the reach of anyone . . . certainly not!

There are those who in their exactness about certain devotions, and even liturgical practices are a bit like the Pharisees, who themselves gave amply of their time, treasure, and talents, but forgot *those greater things of the law*, such as control of the tongue, kindness to the poor and unfortunate, negation of personal pride, and helpfulness towards their neighbor.

There are those who, to coin an ancient Near Eastern phrase: "strain out the gnat and swallow the camel" ... sacrificing principle for expediency, and substituting external (and accepted) correctness, for rightness of heart.

Still, there are others who make religious observance a means to social advancement or personal gain, making a pretense of piety, or even using forms of piety to win the support (and perhaps admiration) of their peers. All these and many others like them, are the people of 'the letter that kills'... neglecting the spirit that gives life.

For the genuine Catholic Christian there is no contrast of letter and spirit. That persons' religion is a reasonable and sincere service of God, and their practices of piety are the genuine expression of *faith* and *humility*. That person never uses religion or piety as an instrument of propaganda for worldly and personal purposes. That person is not like the Pharisees who prayed their prayers in the crowded centers of the city, and made a show in giving of alms. The genuine Christian knows that those who are religious exteriorly because religion brings profit, receive the reward that they seek, but no other. Our Lord was clear: "Verily, I say to you, they have received their reward!" (St. Matt.: Ch. 6, Vs. 5). The genuine Christian knows that all mere externalism is worthless, that the eye if his Father sees what is secret, and that the only rewards worth seeking are riches in Heaven.
